4c MOTH - BROWN COLOUR OMITTED by Colin Hamilton

We have had one or two inquiries from lucky owners of this superb variety (which we had the great pleasure of distributing through our New Variety Service recently) about the apparently marked difference in the appearance of the yellow areas of the error stamp when compared with a normal stamp.

In the "No Browns", the value '4c' and the words 'New Zealand' are very much thicker than they appear to be in normal copies, and in fact "run into" their neighbours to such an extent that - especially in the case of the country name - they are difficult to read. (See illustration at top of page).

The explanation is really quite simple. We are seeing (in the error stamps) a basic "trick" used in multicolour printing, a trick which is usually concealed (in normally printed stamps).

Wherever it is at all possible, the plate-maker will make provision for darker colours to slightly overlap lighter colours wherever they meet in the printed design. By this means he allows for a certain margin of error in colour registration which can and does occur during the normal process of printing.

Taking the case in point, it is easy to imagine what would happen if the printing area on the

yellow plate were cut exactly to the size of the letters as they appear in a normal stamp—the very slightest shift of the yellow in relation to the brown (or vice versa) during printing would produce messy-looking lettering, part-yellow and part-white. So this problem is overcome by providing a slightly larger printing area on the yellow plate than is required by the finished design, and the surplus is effectively masked by the superimposition of the darker (brown) colour. If one examines any normal 4c stamp under a good glass, the overlapping of the colours is quite obvious. The clean-cut lettering of the finished stamp is, of course, achieved by means of the sharply defined edges of the printing area of the brown plate.

Another correspondent, having worked out for himself the explanation thus far, carries the question a stage farther. "Why", he wonders, "is the yellow cut to shape at all, when a solid block of colour would have produced the required result?" A good point, to which I think the probable answer is that while overlapping of the colours is not readily noticeable so long as the overlap is in the form of a regular, even "shadow", there is a strong possibility that (for example) a solid rectangular block of yellow around the words "New Zealand" would be obtrusively evident, even when "covered up" by the brown colour, and would thus mar the overall appearance of the stamp.

We have (we hope !) already ensured that all whose interests include major errors have had the opportunity of including a copy of this variety in their collections. However, as anyone who has seen it will readily testify, the "No Brown" really is something rather special - no, quite breathtaking! - so there may be some readers who, while not normally interested in missing colours, would like to give themselves an exceptional treat. At the time of writing, we still have a very few copies available at the privilege price of £47. 50 to regular clients.

Footnote. It is evident (from the note in the accompanying N. Z. Newsletter) that my colleague Warwick Paterson anticipated similar queries on the point discussed above. Since "Newsletter" and "Bulletin" notes are in the nature of things normally written independently and without inter-branch consultation, it is I suppose inevitable that overlapping - if the pun is forgiveable - of topics is an occasional hazard.

Q. E. 2d SURCHARGE ON 12d "SMALL FIGURES" - C.P. N41a, S.G. 763b

Most readers will know that the surcharge on this error stamp normally has the large obliterating dot (measuring $4\frac{1}{4}$ mm approx. in diameter).

A number of years ago, however - in May 1966 to be precise - we reported (in the columns of the N. Z. Newsletter) having seen a solitary used copy of N41a with the $\underline{\text{small}}$ dot surcharge $(3\frac{3}{4}\text{mm})$ diameter). Both sizes of dot occur with more or less equal frequency on the common surcharged issue of the $1\frac{1}{2}$ d with large figure of value (N40a), of course, but the 1966 copy of the error stamp remained the only recorded example with the small dot.

Now we can confirm the existence of a single $\underline{\min}$ copy, shown to us by Mr. J. Kersey. It will be interesting to see if this report brings to light any further examples. Since there is no reason to believe that the formes used for surcharging ever included a mixture of large and small dots, at least one complete sheet with the small dot surcharge must have existed.

Incidentally, Mr. Kersey tells us that the stamp has been in his possession for a number of years, unrecognised for what it is, but he has been doing some re-checking of his collection against a recently-acquired copy of our Catalogue, and this was one of his finds. There must surely be a moral here for others who don't yet own a C. P. Catalogue!
