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### N.Z. NOTES AND COMMENT

A Health Problem. Question — in the 1961 Health issue, how does one distinguish between plate blocks from large sheets, and similar blocks from miniature sheets? That was the starting point for what proved to be quite an interesting little exercise.

The background to the question is, of course, that in three consecutive years' Health issues — 1959, 1960 and 1961 — large sheets and miniature sheets both carried the same plate numbers in the same positions in the bottom selvedge. The 1959 and 1960 sheets present no difficulty in this respect. In the 1959s, a printer's imprint appears immediately to the right of the plate numbers in the large sheets, but this imprint is absent from the miniature sheets. In the 1960s, while plate numbers and imprints are common to both types of sheet, the gauge of the perforations is the giveaway (13 x 13½ come from large sheets, 11½ x 11 from miniature sheets). But in the 1961s there are no such obvious differences.

Consultation of the N.Z. Handbook (Volume 6, page 221) suggested we might be pursuing a red herring. There it is stated that in the large sheets, the printer's imprint and plate number appear below stamps 1 and 2 (of the bottom row), while in miniature sheets, these markings appear below stamps 2 and 3. Obviously if this were so, then corner blocks showing the markings would be at once identifiable one from the other. Unfortunately, though, the Handbook is in error on this point. The imprint and plate number are in fact identically placed in the large sheets and miniature sheets, i.e. below stamps 1 and 2 in the bottom selvedge in both cases.


On the evidence of the limited quantity of material we had available for examination it would appear, however, that there is a ready means of identifying the source of 1961 blocks. In all of the full-sheet blocks we looked at, the vertical rows of perforations continued downwards through the bottom selvedge, while in the miniature sheets, the bottom selvedge was invariably imperforate. So subject to blocks turning up to prove the contrary, that seems to provide the answer to our opening question.

But that wasn't the end of the matter. Following up a specific line of inquiry in matters philatelic is a bit like looking up a reference in an encyclopedia — there is a strong tendency to get side-tracked on to something else. And so it proved here, Although as far as we know no attempt has been made to "plate" the 1961 miniature sheets (as has been done in several other

issues), it is recorded that they were printed from a "sixteen-up" plate, with the panes arranged in four rows of four, and that perforation was effected by a double-comb machine moving sideways. Now it would be logical to assume that the perforating was done prior to any guillotining. However, not only is the bottom selvedge of the miniature sheets invariably imperf. (as has already been mentioned), but so too is the top selvedge. On the face of it, that seems to suggest that horizontal guillotining, into strips one-sheet deep, preceded perforation, and that the perforating head used was an extraordinarily small one, shaped thus:



However, we have isolated miniature sheets perforated by **four entirely different sets of pins.** This fact would mean that of necessity four different machines had been used for what was a relatively small job. A much more likely explanation is that no guillotining took place before perforating, and that just one head was employed, but a special and very unusual one, made up of four sections, each of the above configuration, and each separated from its neighbour by a pinless "gutter", thus:



This knowledge, incidentally, would considerably simplify the work of anyone setting out to reconstruct a "sixteen-up" sheet. Given a mixed stock of miniature sheets, they could first be quite easily sorted by perforation characteristics into four groups, i.e. one group from each section of the head. That accomplished, the remaining task would be to identify just four different types within each group.
