GTAR WATHRMARKS. The paper supplied by Perizins Bacon for the Carly New Zealand Stamp had a large star watermark and it is found on issues from 1855 to 1871. If one examines a sheet of 240 starps it will be noticed that the entire watermark consists of the large starg spaced so that one falls on each sterp with the exception of those stamps on the four sides of each sheot and these may be found with five vertical or horizontal lines covering about half the stanp on parts of letters making up the word "postage" in double line letters. I was very puzzled for years at finding watermarks as above doscribed until I saw a print of the entire narking. The five parallel limes fom a border and the word "postage" is let in at about the midale of the side.

This sane paper was also sent to several other British Colonies about the same tine and the sane watermark varieties therefore exist elsewhere. As sone of the later full face issuos and the Richardson prints are catalogued separately in megpect of stamps with papermakers names instead of no watermank or star watermank surely the varieties I have mentioned dognve similar reco collection and they are naturally far morg rare than the normal stanp.

The scarcity of dated town postmarks on the imperforate full face issues is realised by few collectors until they try to buy ther. In a copy of the "Iondon Philatelist" dated October 1894 will be found details of an enquiry aade, and it was revealed that out of 5,000 imperforate stamps exanined only the following had dated postmerks:-
15 on blue unwaternarked paper
74 on white
76 on other imperforate varieties.

These figures were made up from the examination of leading dealers stocks and specialists collections

Iess than four stans in every 100 - so it is quite clear thet they are worth looking for. The perforated issues with such postrarks aro not so rare but shouid be bought when offered. I have always felt that insufficiont interest is tramen in postrarks and the close connection they have to the old history of New Zoaland. I will write a few notos soon about postmarks.

Type 6OB one of which appears as ro-entry; the other two which are paired show either daraced plates over the averoge or perhaps a nove in the paper the crown ornaments being completely blurred out with colour and the $D$ above the value ( $1 / 2$ ) is joined to the top line and also just a blob of colour.

I hove bech acquaintod through the years with various Colonial stams incluling nany of $B_{r i t a i n, ~ b u t ~ t h e s e ~ g t a m p s ~ a r e ~ v e r y ~}^{\text {g }}$ diffonent frot the general run, I have not cleaned then, they are just as I picked then fron anong an assorted lot of Now Zoalond starps, and though they are not guperb apecinens they soun worthy of consideration in viow of the fact that the damed orom and ornanents are quite clear. If you wish I will send just as I've found theri; I camot detect any watormark."

It aons occur to ne that on paces $I_{1} 2$ and above I have gubnitted several itens that require menbers attention.
