

CAMPBELL PATERSON'S CATALOGUE OF NEW ZEALAND STAMPS

This most excellent book in loose-leaf form has recently come to hand; somewhat novel in its layout I do feel that it should be commented upon.

When I first read it I did not like the innovation of arranging the sequence of the various classes of issues in order of face value - that is to say - all ld values of the full face stamps follow each other from 1855 to 1872, and then on the next page all the 2d stamps covering the same period.

and so on to the 1/-d stamp.

I was a little muddled at first when referring to the book, but as time went on I came to like the new method of presentation and, finally, having got used to it, I have come to the conclusion that the "new book" has considerable merit. I do not advocate setting out one's collection on this basis and still prefer to have the old and accepted sequence as in all catalogues for so many years. For quick reference in turning up a particular stamp the new "Paterson method" is good, and I congratulate him on being so bold as to break away from diehard tradition.

Next is the way he sets out the various types of watermarks; they are all together on one page and plainly illustrated. The presentation of the re-entries of various issues is
good, the re-entry markings being very plainly superscribed
over the normal stamp so that any collector not too familiar
with re-entries can readily see what to look for. This sort
of thing popularizes philately and gives considerable encouragement to the collecting of stamps. These remarks also apply to
re-touches and are a wonderful help to the student of these
stamps.

The art paper used on pages which carry the many illustrations is most suitable for the purpose the blocks being very clear which is rarely the case on ordinary paper. Additional pages are to be available to subscribers from time to time so that the book may be kept up-to-date and also to enable new

features to be incorporated.

I strongly advise all those interested in any of the New Zealand stamps to get this book either from Campbell Paterson, Epson, Auckland, New Zealand or from distributors in this country. (See the N.R.Dawe advertisement in this issue). Price including postage is 46/-d.

I have recently received from New Zealand Imprint blocks of the 3d overprint, Plate Nos. 112, 113, 114, 115, 117, 118. addition to these I understand there are also Plates 108,109 (very scarce) and 116.

My correspondent in New Zealand has sent me a supply of Plates 112,113,115,117 and 118 and I should be pleased to

supply blocks to nembers at 2/6d each.

2d Rose (Sideface) 1874/5

I recently purchases about 1000 copies of this stamp for the purpose of study and the results of my examination of then may be of interest.

I have found that the right hand vertical frame has been re-touched, that is to say, the outer line is double the thickness of the normal frame. I also notice about 25 copies with no shade lines on the Queen's forehead; this may be due to plate wear. A plate flaw occurs in the outer centre of the bottom right hand triangle; it is quite prominent but I only found one copy.

There is a nice frame variety because I found 6 copies with the line over the word "twopence" severed from the frame

by a gap.

With regard to the colour of this stamp Gibbons quotes Rose only, Pin - Rose(shades), Verne Collins - Rose, Pale Rose and Deep Rose, and Campbell Paterson in his new catalogue also refers to these three shades. My own list of shades is - Pale Rose, Dull Rose, Rose, Deep Rose, Carmine Rose and Pink; the last two are rare.

In the 1000 copies I examined there were 24 stamps with

inverted watermark which Pim Catalogues at 50/-d.

As to perforations I have not the patience to schedule these as there are 11%, 11% nearly 12, 12 and 12%. Numeral postmarks (in bars) range from 1 to 24 and letters are GN, N, NN, C,W,B, L,D,I,TU, AN, MS, Z, AR, AK and AH.

I shall be pleased to demonstrate these stamps at one of

our neetings if members are sufficiently interested.

DEPENDENCIES: INVERTED CENTRES.

The notes by Mr.S.W.Salnon in the last issue of "The Kiwi" prompt me to write on the subject of the so-called varieties of the 1920 issues for the Dependencies - to wit the stamps with inverted centres.

Unfortunately they are catalogued by Stanley Gibbons, but they were certainly never issued. Verne Collins' catalogue of the stamps of the Dependencies states under the heading of Cook Islands - 1920 issue "Varieties of this issue, and of those in the same types for Aitutaki, Nuie and Penrhyn Island, with inverted centres cone from rejected sheets. As printers' waste they should have been destroyed. They were not sent to the New Zealand Post and Telegraph Department, and were certainly not released through regular channels".

With regard to the imperf. varieties, they probably some under the same category. The 1932 pictorials contain one genuine inverted centre viz. the 1d; all other varieties come under the same category as those of 1920. In fact these so-called varieties are similar to the printers waste varieties of the 1876 issue of Fiji, and are only worth collecting as suriosities; they are certainly not worth the prices which some of

then fetch nowadays.

LOOSE LETTER.

With regard to your query as to "Loose Letter" cancellations, I have always understood that as a general rule they were applied to letters posted on ships and cancelled at the port of arrival — in fact much the same as the "Paquebot" Cancellations. But I have also heard that in the case of New Zealand, loose letter cancellations were also used for letters collected in some Rail—way Station letter-boxes, or on trains.

PAQUEBOT CANCELLATIONS

While on the subject of cancellations can any number explain how a 5/-d stamp came to have a Paquebot cancellation? I have a copy SG.290 with such a mark.

POSTAL HISTORY OF NEW ZEALAND

At the Society's March meeting a very fine display and talk was given by Dr.K.J.L.Scott of Woking (Dr.Scott has since become a member of the Society) Major T.H.Pine was kind enough to take the following notes which will give those members who were unable to be present some idea of the scope of Dr.Scott's collection and the extent of his knowledge of the subject dealt with.

NOTES ON THE DISPLAY.

6. Pictorials of 1898-1907. 6d (a) Double print.

(b) Re-entries followed through the series.

7. 4d Geo.V. re-entries in both colours and later re-entries on violet only.

C. Trials.

8. Revenues long type all on cover. Some definitely genuine normal mail rates. Others not so clear but who can say they were not legitimate? They have the correct postmarks!

NOTES FROM NEW ZEALAND.

Now that the 5d value Geo.VI is on issue in Counter coils with printed numbers in selvedge that completes the set of counter coils to date 15 stamps in all,ld,2d,3d,4d,5d and 6d values with handstamped numbers 2d,3d,4d,5d,6d,8d,9d,1/-,1/3,in printed numbers in selvedge.I understand the 1d value will not be issued in printed numbers, and I think it unlikely these counter coils will be continued in the Elizabeth II stamps.

A new printing of the 4d value has come on the P.O.counters; printed on plate 90 the shade is distinct from the earlier print—ings, these new 4d value are in a deep violet shade, rather hard to describe but quite distinct from the earlier magenta shade. Although it has been officially stated that our Coronation issue will remain on issue to pay postage until the issue of the new definitive set in September, it does not say if the Geo.VI issue will be withdrawn from sale in June, so this new 4d may have a comparatively long life. The 3d surcharged stamp is out at many P.O's; they are back on the usual Geo.VI 3d blue. There does not appear to be any difference in shade in this new supply of Geo.VI 3d. Although this 3d surcharge did not have a very long life later the numbers issued will be available and we will know how many were printed. Plate 109 will be scarce. The postal stationery letter—cards with the 2d red oval stamp has been overprinted in black 3d.
