CHARLES THOMAS PHILLIPE ULM 1897 - 1934.

The Bulletin notes of November 1970 seem to have proved of use to a number of readers, and some were sufficiently interested to suggest that further background information about the pioneer flights and early fliers might be helpful. This month's notes are put together from information found in The Postage Stamps of New Zealand Vol. 1, The Australian Airmail Catalogue Vol. 1, and Australian Encyclopedia Vol IX.

Charles Ulm's parents were emigrants from Paris, and he was born in Melbourne in 1897. In the First World War he joined up while under age, using the name of Charles Jackson, served in Gallipoli, and France, was twice wounded and discharged home. In 1917, he re-enlisted in his own name, again served in France, was wounded, and went to Officers' Training School, later qualifying as a pilot. (This statement contradicts the previously stated fact that he took his pilot's exams whilst in New Zealand in 1928, and I presume that Ulm had qualified during the war as a military pilot, but held no civilian licence.)

Returning to Australia, he formed in 1919 Aviation Service Co. to establish regular air services in New South Wales, but the venture failed. He met Charles Kingsford Smith in Sydney in 1927, when the latter was planning a flight across the Pacific from the U.S.A. to Australia. Ulm proposed however that prior to undertaking this they should attempt a round Australia trip with the object of attracting publicity and also for experience, as the route to be followed was much the same distance as that of the projected Trans Pacific flight. The Round-Australia trip was accomplished in ten days and the hoped for publicity produced a cheque for £3,000 from the N.S.W. Government.

On 31st May 1928, Ulm was a member of Kingsford Smith's crew which left Oakland California for the flight to Australia via Honolulu and Fiji. A small amount of mail was carried on this flight and in 1968, a set of four stamps was issued by Fiji to mark the 40th anniversary of the landing of their plane Southern Cross at Suva on the record breaking Trans Pacific flight.

Ulm was associated with Kingsford Smith in forming Australian National Airways Ltd, a company which was intended to fly inter-state passengers and mail in the Commonwealth and which it was also hoped would obtain the contract for flying overseas mail — a contract which in fact was awarded to QANTAS, but Ulm's chief claim to philatelic fame lies in the several flights which he made between Australia and New Zealand carrying mail.

On Sept 10th 1928, Ulm flew with Kingsford Smith from Sydney in the plane Southern Cross on the first Trans Tasman crossing carrying a small mail. Ten covers carried on this flight were pilot signed and received the cancellation of Christchurch, 12th Sept 1928. On the return flight from Blenheim to Sydney, the limited amount of mail carried was cancelled Blenheim 430A 130C28 and backstamped Richmond NSW 230A 140C28.

In Jan 1933 and a year later in January '34, Kingsford Smith flew Southern Cross from Australia to New Zealand, and on each of these occasions a very small amount of mail was carried. Ulm was not associated with either of these flights.

When in 1932 Australian National Airways went into liquidation, Ulm acquired one of the Avro aircraft, "Southern Moon", lengthened the wings to give it extra lift and renamed it "Faith in Australia".

In June 1933 he flew from Australia to England, and in October of the same year, made a record breaking England-Australia flight in 6 days, 17 hours.

In December 1933 Ulm flew "Faith in Australia" from Sydney to New Plymouth on the first Trans Tasman flight on which passengers were carried. Approval was given for a special stamp to be prepared for use on mail to be carried on the return flight, which was to be the first official New Zealand - Australia air mail. Ulm was invited to send suggestions to the Postmaster General's Department for a suitable printing of stamps to be prepared. He obtained six copies of the N.Z. 7d brown-orange air mail stamp and had them overprinted in green by Andrews, Baly & Co Ltd, of Christchurch who were printing some special covers for the return flight. The overprint read "Trans Tasman/Flight/Faith in Australia" in three lines. The overprinting of the name of the plane was in a type known as "Canberra Condensed", while the first two lines were in 14 point thin sans serif capitals. Official approval was given to the use of this commemorative overprint, and a special printing was made of the 7d stamp in sky blue with the overprint in royal blue, slightly amended to read "Trans Tasman/Airmail/Faith in Australia" and printed in somewhat smaller seriffed 10 point "Canberra Condensed".

The special stamp was placed on sale on Jan 17th 1934 and remained on sale till the mail closed on Feb 17th when unsold copies were destroyed. Only 83,078 stamps were sold, and with these figures, it seems to be a much under-rated stamp. Some examples are said to exist of the essay prepared by Ulm postmarked on covers.

100 postcards showing the Faith in Australia and Ulm and his crew were also franked with the blue 7d stamp and flown to Australia. The postal rate was made up of 1d for the postage and 6d for air mail. In this instance the greater part of the 6d air mail fee is said to have been given to Ulm. greater part of the 6d air mail fee is said to have been given to Ulm.

To defray his expenses, Ulm also had a number of special covers printed for sale. These showed a Kookaburra and a Kiwi and bore the wording Per UH VXX "Faith in Austrlia" C. T. P. Ulm. Commander. 40,000 were printed in blue on manilla, 200 in deep blue on white and 100 in green on white.

Flown mail was cancelled with a temporary skeleton cancellation reading AUCKLAND 1 NZ17FE34 and a circular violet cachet reading FIRST TRANS TASMAN AIR MAIL NEW ZEALAND AUSTRALIA FEB 1934, struck in violet.

As already mentioned, Kingsford Smith had flown to New Zealand in Southern Cross in January 1934, and on his return flight made on March 29th an official air mail was carried by the Southern Cross. Details of the special covers prepared for this flight and of the mail carried were given in the Bulletin of Nov 1970.

On April 1st 1934 Ulm flew the First Official Australia - N.Z. mail, said to consist of 5 cwt containing 37,170 items. No special stamps were issued, but envelopes on either blue or manilla were printed in four designs, showing either the Kookaburra and Kiwi or maps of the Commonwealth and Dominion. Wording was per VH UXX "Faith in Australia" C. T. P. Ulm Commander. First Official Airmail Australia to New Zealand. An oblong violet cachet similarly worded and including the date April 1934 was applied to all mail carried.

It is recorded that when designing the Bell Block Aerodrome air stamps Berry was supplied with a photograph taken on April 12th 1934 when "Faith in Australia" was coming in to land at Bell Block, New Plymouth.

A return N.Z. - Australia mail carrying flight was made on Apl. 14th and special covers were again printed. A cachet similar to that used on the 17th Feb flight was struck reading TRANS TASMAN AIRMAIL FAITH IN AUSTRALIA NEW ZEALAND AUSTRALIA APL 1934. Postage was again 7d and a temporary skeleton cancellation KAITAIA 1 14 AP34 N.Z. was used.

The postal authorities made special arrangements in connection with these flights to enable collectors to have covers flown from one country to the other and back again to the original addressee.

On July 2nd 1934 Ulm flew from Kaitaia in the "Faith in Australia" for Sydney from whence he was onward bound north to Brisbane, Rockhampton, Cairns, Townsville, Port Moresby (Papua) and Lae (New Guinea).

Special covers were prepared for this flight both by New Zealand and Australian collectors and some were flown on the various intermediate stages. Facilities were again made to enable collectors to have covers flown and returned to themselves.

This flight was the last "philatelic event" with which Ulm was connected. On Dec 4th 1934 he flew out of Vancouver on a Trans Pacific flight to Australia with his old colleagues J. L. Skilling and G. M. Littlejohn as navigator and wireless operator. Some where between Frisco and Hawaii they lost radio contact, then after a brief snatch of a message, they were lost, and have never been heard of again.

- 301 (a) 4d Yellow and 4d Violet. The major "Club-foot" re-entry (R4/10) in matching two-perf variety pairs, mint, both colours. 'Nuff said! The two two-perf variety pairs £12.50
- (b) As above A lovely mint and used collection of these twin stamps. The mint include copies (in yellow) of both major "Wrong value" re-entries (R1/6 and R4/10), the latter being in a two-perf vertical pair, and an impressive array of shades, including the scarce deep purple, perf 14 X 13½. Among the used are examples (in violet) of these same re-entries, plus two others from plate 44. Altogether 25 mint, 9 used - a wonderful lot for the specialist at ... £13.50
- (c) 4½d Deep Green. Mint singles in each perf., immaculate. The two 92p
- (d) 5d Blue. Delicate shades galore in perf 14 X 13½ (6) and 14 X 14½ (4). Ten stamps, all mint £5.25
- (e) 6d Carmine. Again both the usual perfs are well represented in a total of 15 stamps, all mint (6 with "Official" overprint). In addition there are 3 copies on the provisional Pictorial paper, line perf 14 - one of these is the no-wmk variety! A glowing pageful £5.50
- (f) 7½d Deep Red-brown. Singles in each perf. The two mint 50p
- (g) 8d Indigo-blue and 8d Red-brown. In the indigo there are singles in each perf, complemented by a two-perf vertical pair, while in the later brown there are good shades (two of each) both with and without "Official" overprint. (The 8d Official, by the way, is recommended as particularly good holding). 8 stamps, mint £4.50

- (h) 9d Sage Green. In perf 14 X 13½, three glorious shades, including the distinctive and scarce yellowish-olive, plus one overprinted "Official". In perf 14 X 14½, two shades. Six stamps, all mint £3.75
- (i) As above. The good yellowish-olive shade, perf 14 X 13½, used 50p
- (j) 1/- Vermilion. From full rich vermilion to the very pale salmon – the shades displayed here must be seen to be believed. 12 mint (5 overprinted "Official") and 12 used, providing a gorgeous splash of colour £8
- 302 K. G. V. 1d Field Marshal. A fine specialist lot, all papers and perfs represented. Rich in mint blocks, including one on Wiggins Teape paper (C. P. K15d), and a complete booklet pane with "Parisian" and "Jeyes" ads, while among the Officials there is a "No stop" variety in pair with normal. Highlighting the collection are two striking shades, mint, of the rare Abnormal Paper issue with wmk reversed (K15c). 38 mint, 12 used £13.50
- 303 K. G. V. 2/- and 3/- Admiral. A lovely mint lot on both Jones and Cowan papers, with 2/- (5, one having wmk inverted, and two overprinted "Official") and 3/- (2) £13

- 304 (a) 1931-34 "Lake Scene". Two excellent shades each of the 3d, 4d and 7d orange, and one each of the 5d on 3d green and the 7d blue "Trans Tasman" overprint. Condition is beautifully fresh mint throughout. Also included is an additional copy of the 7d Trans Tasman, used on a 1934 first flight cover £10
- (b) 1935 "Aerodrome". An equally fine lot, rich in shades of the 1d (3 mint, 6 used), 3d (3 mint, 6 used) and 6d (2 mint, 6 used incl. a block of 4). Again a first flight cover (using all three values) completes a worthwhile lot £5.50

Some single issue collections which are perennially popular, so our advice is DON'T DELAY!

- 305 1936 ANZAC. Singles mint and used, blocks of 4 mint, and four plate blocks of each value, showing all positions in which the plate number occurred on the sheet £2.50
- 306 1936 Chambers of Commerce. The set in blocks of 4 mint, and singles used, and plate blocks of each value (two in the case of the 1d) representing every plate used. As in the ANZAC's, plate numbers exist in any one corner of the sheet, so to show this we've included a complete set of plate blocks of the ½d value, showing all four positions. Finally there is a ½d variety block – the spectacular "Bomb burst in tree" (R2/6). A splendid lot £5.75
- 307 1931 Health. A magnificent horizontal pair of the scarcer 1d + 1d Red Boy, sparkling mint. The pair £22.50
- 308 1925 Dunedin Exhibition. All of these are in truly "exhibition" condition, mint!

- 311 1964 Road Safety. The outstanding "Apostrophe after NEW" flaw (R3/2) in mint positional block 35p
- 312 1965 ANZAC 4d. Three lovely shades, used 10p
- 313 1965 I.C.Y. Two fine shades with "wmk sideways inverted (normal for this issue) plus a copy with the scarcer "wmk sideways", Three used 25p
- 314 1969 Capt Cook Bicentenary. We have a few copies of the 6c with a wild misplacement to the right (about 9mm!) of the embossing, so that only a portion of the embossed head appears on the stamp. Each, mint 25p
- 315 1963 Christmas. Readers will recall that this stamp appeared with "wmk sideways" and "wmk sideways inverted", and in two distinctive shades of the red colour. Here we have both the catalogued shades with both forms of watermark both mint and used. How's that for completion! 4 mint and 4 used 30p
- 316 1940 Centennial. All values represented, both mint and used, and with and without "Official" overprint, some blocks and pairs included. There is a plate strip of 4 of the 1/-, additional variety blocks (3) of the 1½d and 10d on 1½d surcharge, and a first flight cover. 60 mint, 28 used and one cover, all well written up ... £11
- 317 1948 Otago Centennial. Very strong in varieties (5 blocks) and plate blocks, which are complete. A total of 67 mint, 20 used and 2 F.D.C. (one with special cancellation), neatly mounted on 9 album leaves, with all the write-up material you need £3.75
- 318 1950 Canterbury Centennial. Again plate numbers are complete, with additional shades of the 6d and 1/- values, both in plate blocks and singles. Nice used blocks of 4 and a F.D.C. round off a fine showing £3.50
- 319 1953 Coronation and Royal Visit. A comprehensive lot, all plate numbers of both issues included (the Coronation 2d and 4d are present in combined Imprint/Plate blocks of 8), variety blocks (3), and a pair of the 2d Coronation in the scarcer pale blue shade. 69 mint, 13 used and 4 covers (two of which are illustrated F.D.C.) £7
- 320 1955 Stamp Centennial. The beautiful 3d value (based on the Chalon Head design of 1855) is particularly prominent here with 7 blocks included. There are shade blocks of all values, and plate numbers are complete. In all, 84 mint, 12 used and 1 cover £4.25
- 321 1956 Southland Centennial. A fascinating lot, with among the varieties two sheet value blocks of the 3d, showing progressive states of the well-known plate crack. Other items include Plate/Imprint blocks complete, and some shade blocks. 78 stamps, all mint, and 1 F.D.C. £7
- 322 1957 Lamb Export. The plates used for this issue were un-numbered but varieties more than compensate for the lack of plate blocks. This collection includes a mint block of the scarce 4d wmk inverted, and in the 8d the constant "Accent on 8" (R8/11), and "Dot in date" (R10/1), each in mint and used blocks (one of the used blocks has defects, and is not reckoned in the price). The collection of 18 mint, 8 used and 1 F.D.C. £9
- 323 1957 Plunket Society Jubilee. Two fine pages, with mint pairs on thick and thin papers, two variety blocks, plate blocks (2) and a F.D.C. 26 mint and 1 cover £1
- 324 1957 First Tasman Flight. Matching large plate blocks (of 9 stamps each) from plates 1 and 2 showing, on R10/3, a flaw common to both plates. In addition there are three other constant varieties, normal- size plate blocks (4 stamps) and two illustrated covers, one a F.D.C., the other having a special flight cancellation. Plus all the information you need to write up Sir Charles Kingsford Smith's historic flight £3.50
- 325 1958 Hawkes Bay Centennial. The set of three in singles, plate blocks (3d plate 7 with and without stop both included), and on F.D.C. The only constant variety of note, the 3d R10/2, aptly described here as the "Lost egg" variety, is also present

- 326 1959 Pan Pacific Scout Jamboree. Block of 4, plate numbers A1, A2, B1, and B2 in blocks of 4, and a F.D.C. Simple, straightforward — and complete! 90p

- 328 1959 Red Cross. A colourful display including a plate/imprint block, 3 variety blocks (one of which has no less than three constant varieties!) and a F.D.C. £2.20
- 329 1960 Westland Centennial. For some reason plate/imprint blocks of the 3d Gold Digger are very elusive, but both are present in this collection, together with 2d and 8d plate and imprint blocks. In addition there is a 3d variety block. A fine lot of 49 mint and a F.D.C. £6.25
- 330 1965 ANZAC. Very pretty stamps, these, with in each value 3 contrasting shades and a plate block of six. Three fine variety blocks make up a spectacular display of 38 stamps, all mint..... £4

- 331 Royal Society Centenary. The specialised collection including four plate blocks and imprint block of the 4 cent, inverted watermark, and the R2/8 (flaw on W of NEW) and R1/10 (large white flaw) varieties. In the 8 cent there are plate and imprint blocks and two variety blocks which between them show the varieties R7/6 joined letters, R1/10 retouch above head and R2/7, scratch on coat. Also a First Day Cover. The Collection as described. All mint except the F.D.C. £6
- 332 Commemorative Collection 1968. Maori Bible, plate blocks 1A, 1B and 2A, two striking shades and the constant R4/5 variety from plate 2A, loop on leg of N. Armed Forces, plate blocks of each value, shades of the 10 cent (pale and dark) and blocks of four the 4 cent and 28 cent with inverted watermark varieties Human Rights and Universal Suffrage, imprint/plate blocks of each. In addition, there is a First Day Cover of each of the four sets. The Complete Series of all Commemorative stamps issued in 1968 as described £13
- 333 Commemorative Collection 1969. I. L. O. plate block, value block and F.D.C. Law Society with a good range of five different plate blocks of the 3 cent, two of the 10 cent and five various combinations in the 18 cent. There is a range of shades represented in blocks and also two unusual but constant varieties; on the 3 cent there occurs a position in which the sky is white instead of blue, and on the 10 cent in the third vertical line of stamps the owl has a horn in every stamp in that row. Both these items are present in blocks — altogether a fine showing of this issue. Otago University is fully represented by two plate blocks of each value, shades and the value block which includes the R2/9 variety "extra chimney" — attractive and readily seen. Kerikeri includes a block of each value, and the constant "splash of blue paint on house". The year finishes with imprint/plate blocks of the Corso issue. First Day Covers of all the issues mentioned are included. The Complete Collection.£7.75
- 334 Capt. Cook. A separate offer is made of this issue in view of the general interest in the thematic collecting of Capt Cook, and this grand lot includes an "Exhibition Class" study of these stamps. A straight set of single stamps one from the big sheet printing and one from the miniature sheet printing enables you to demonstrate the differences between the two printings. Then follow five different Miniature Sheet printings showing the five different characteristics found in these printing plus the sheet with official overprint for Tarapex. Plate blocks of each value are included, and the various variety blocks (retouches etc) found on the stamps. Finally we have First Day Covers (two different types in attractive designs) and a complete set of the covers for each day of the National Exhibition Tarapex£10

Commemorative Collection 1970. Cardigan Bay F. D. C. and Imprint/ Plate Block (10) Expo F. D. C. and Imprint Blocks of all three values, U. N. F. D.
