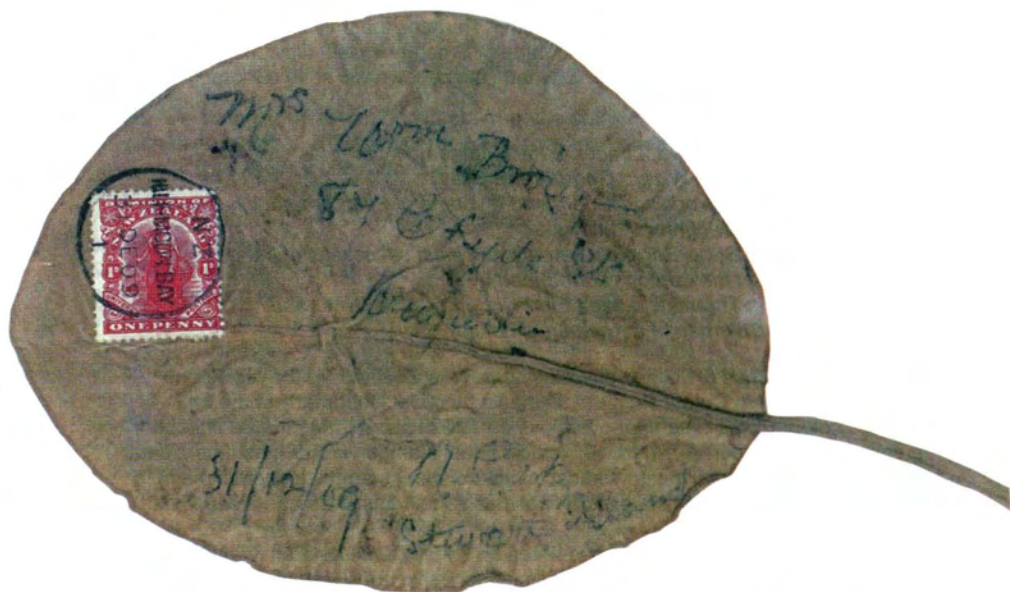

NEW ISSUES AND VARIETIES

The Hobbit II: The Desolation of Smaug (1 November 2013)

Here we have the second of Sir Peter Jackson's Hobbit Trilogy – The Desolation of Smaug. The film has produced positive critical reviews and the set of stamps are equally fine.

Repeating the usual film stamps format, we have six stamps in gummed sheets of 25 and a set of six gummed miniature sheets, and six self-adhesive stamps in a self-adhesive strip of six and a booklet. Once more the six stamps feature key characters from the film and are well selected. This time the six images selected for the stamps work particularly well in the larger miniature sheet format. CP Newsletter readers will have noted that I selected the two best miniature sheets for the front cover of last month's CP Newsletter. Perhaps the only slight disappointment was that there was no trace of Smaug himself! Obviously this is being saved up for Hobbit Film No. 3, when I suspect we will have a thoroughly dragon-centric stamp issue.

70c Thorin Oakenshield, *Leader of the Company of Dwarves.*

\$1.40 The Middle-earth Wizard Gandalf the Grey.

\$1.90 Captain of the Woodland Guard and favourite of King Thranduil is Tauriel, *a young Silvan Elf, Daughter of Mirkwood*

\$2.10 The Hobbit Bilbo Baggins *Perhaps the least successful of the designs, this depicts Bilbo in the tree-tops surrounded by birds.*

\$2.40 Son of King Thranduil is High Elf, Prince Legolas Greenleaf

\$2.90 Bard the Bowman, *a bargeman of Lake-town.*

Ross Dependency – Antarctic Food Chain (20 November 2013)

This issue has been given the title 'Antarctic Food Web', this is not a phrase which I have ever come across before and I think a more correct description would be 'Antarctic Marine Food Chain' and this is thus the title we have given this issue.

The five stamps depict the food chain from the smallest to the largest. They are attractive stamps, similar in many ways (perhaps understandably) to those previously issued by British Antarctic Territory.

Designs:

70c Antarctic Krill Small shrimp-like crustaceans – the most abundant species on the planet.

\$1.40 Lesser Snow Petrel pure white plumage and one of only three bird species to breed exclusively in Antarctica.

\$1.90 Adelie Penguin together with the Emperor Penguin, these are the only two penguin species on the Antarctic Mainland itself.

\$2.40 Crabeater Seal The world's most numerous seal species which eats around 20kg of krill every day.

\$2.90 Blue Whale The world's largest animal, up to 30 metres long and weighing up to 170 tonnes. Almost unbelievably, the blue whale eats up to 40 million krill a day.

The two First Day Covers for the set of five stamps and the five stamp miniature sheet feature photographs of the Ross Sea by Don LeRoi, Aerial Imaging Solutions and Mike Usher; and two Antarctic diatom photos by Richard Crawford and Marina Montresor both of the Alfred Wegener Institute.

Designed by Gregory Millen, Paraparaumu, Kapiti Coast, printed by Southern Colour Print Ltd, Dunedin by offset lithography in the four process colours, horizontal mesh, p.14 on Tullis Russell 104gsm red phosphor gummed stamp paper. Five stamps in sheets of 25 and a five-stamp miniature sheet. RD133a-RD137a, RDM133-7

2013 New Zealand Collection (20 November 2013)

Entitled 'Take a Closer Look - New Zealand Stories in Stamps 2013', this is the usual hardback book format, from January's Year of the Snake right up to date to November's Hobbit II The Desolation of Smaug.

However, there is a major difference with this year's collection – the Limited Edition imperforate sheetlet, which this year is the excellent Classic Travel Posters, is provided in a strange format. This is described as a 'cancelled sheet', and bears a printed Wanganui postmark 20 Nov 2013 cancelling the top two right stamps in the sheetlet. The other 18 stamps in the

2003 PE25b 50c AILSA MOUNTAINS, FIORDLAND – SILVER OVERPRINT VARIETY

A most interesting variety has been shown to us by Mr Brian Stallard of Wellington. As can be seen by the illustration on page 4, this consists of a 5mm shift to the right of the silver overprint of fern with fronds. This means that the silver overprint now appears in the lower left corner of the stamp immediately to the right in each case.

Only the top left quarter of the sheet (25) was affected, indicating the overprinting forme of 25 impressions was thus used four times for each sheet of 100 stamps. This new variety will be listed as PE25b(Y).

However, close study of the top two rows of this variety as shown, reveals two further new varieties. Thus, PE25b(Ya) is a pair, PE25a, PE25b(Y) overprint omitted in pair with overprint shifted, This is R1/1, R1/2 down to R5/1, R5/2.

In addition, we have PE25b(Yb) which is a stamp as PE25b(Y), but double overprint, one on right (normal), one shifted to left. This is the stamp R1/6, R2/6, down to R5/6.

Mr Stallard also points out that the usual red "1 of 500" overprint in the top selvedge above R1/1 is also missing. The reason for this omission is unclear.

Since these Silver Fern overprints were released in 2003, we have seen many minor silver shifts on this 50c, and indeed on the other four values: \$1, \$1.50, \$2 and \$5 of the set, but this is by far the largest Silver Fern overprint shift we have seen.

sheetlet are still mint, and if one desired to do so, could still be cut out of the imperf sheet and used on mail. As it stands however, this imperf sheetlet is neither one thing nor the other – it is not mint, it is not used, frankly it's a bit of a dog's breakfast! For this reason, and others, it will not receive the usual full CP Catalogue listing, but only a footnote under the 2013 Classic Travel Posters Catalogue listings.

FIFTY YEARS AGO

From the Newsletter – February 1964 by John Robinson

Railway Centenary Issue S90/91: Personally, the designs remind me of railway posters – in miniature! Perhaps they are meant to. Anyhow, they are not too badly prepared with the emphasis on "prepared". But why are they so coarsely screened? And why should the 3d sheet differ in format from the 1/9d?

Issued on November 25, 1963, there are only two "plate" number combinations in the 3d, viz. **1111** and **2111**. The 1/9d has only **1111**. All sheets are of 120 stamps, but the 3d has 12 horiz. rows, while the 1/9d has only 10. Also, to confuse the issue as it were, the watermark is W8a on the 3d and W8b on the 1/9d; i.e., the stars point to the right in the 3d, and to the left in the 1/9d as viewed from the back.

The blue sky in the 3d is of interest, for it is difficult to find any two units precisely the same, and some are markedly different from their neighbours. Odd, this. The only explanation I can suggest is that differing exposures were given to units in the blue master negative. There is the usual crop of minor blemishes, though apparently nothing of any real interest.

The really big news is the discovery of a complete sheet of the 1/9d with the red colour completely missing. **S91a(Z)** The effect has to be seen to be believed: there is no figure of value, and the scenery is quite unearthly. Here is a splendid variety and the only thing I find wrong with it is that the discoverer was misguided enough to offer it to another dealer!

COMPAC Stamp S92: I like this cheerful newcomer. It certainly matches the bright conversation which took place between Commonwealth Prime Ministers over this new cable at its inauguration! It is our first Australian photogravure stamp and if the Aussies can always produce equally effective stamps surely they deserve **all** our stamp printing contracts. They did, however, keep the better background for their own COMPAC stamp!

The Post Office sheets are, in fact, panes. The LEFT pane has a yellow vertical line in the upper right corner of the selvage, while the RIGHT pane has red, blue and black lines in the upper left selvage. There are no plate numbers nor imprints on either pane, only the "sheet" value in the upper right selvage. There is no watermark and the comb perf gauges 13¼ x 13½.

Varieties:

(a) **Left Pane**, a number of colourless flaws in various units, especially in the red and yellow plates, but these are often not constant, and in any case appear to be insignificant.

(b) **Right Pane**, the usual minor blemishes are here too. **R7/4** has a red spot in the yellow area above ND of ZEALAND. This is constant. **R10/4** has a small flaw in the blue plate causing a break in the green cable strand leading to "E". This flaw does **not** appear on every "right" pane seen. (S92a(Z))

It is possible that various flaws could be shared with common or "duty" plates as used for the Australian stamp, but I have not had the opportunity to examine full sheets of the latter.

We understand that, in error, the COMPAC stamp was issued at the Paihia Post Office on 2 December, instead of 3 December 1963.

1963 Christmas, Imperforate SC4a(Z)

A complete sheet of this truly major variety has been distributed by a London dealer. This sheet was found in Wellington, according to a report in "Stamp Collecting".

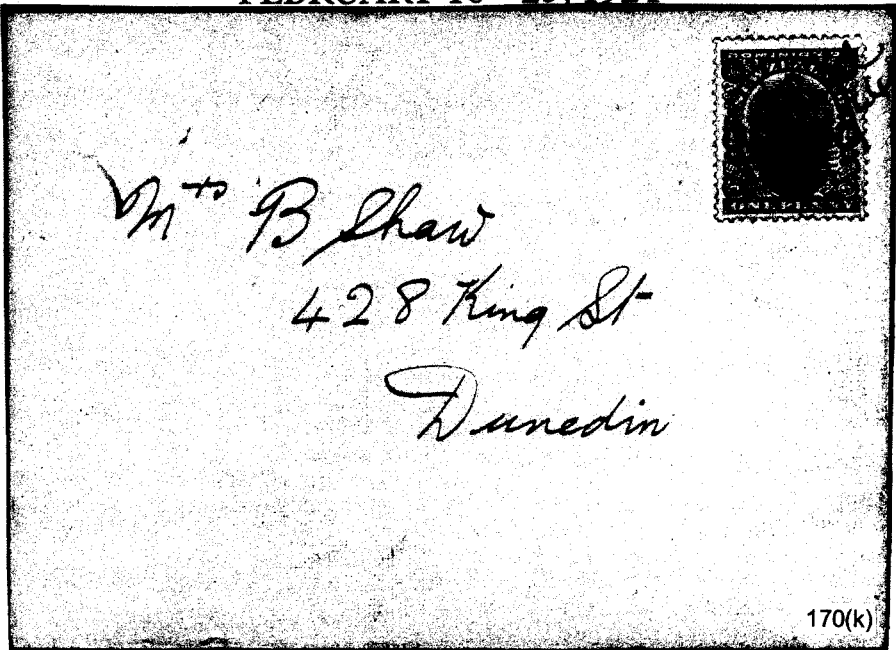
FIFTY YEARS AGO

Our New Zealand Loose-leaf Catalogue. A nice compliment was paid to our Catalogue recently by Mr Kenneth F. Chapman, Editor of "Stamp Collecting". Discussing the new S.G. Great Britain Specialised Catalogue he said, (Stamp Collecting November 8, 1963, page 371) quote: "the man who got down to the detailed planning and the actual execution of much of the work ... has produced for another country what many regard as the ideal specialised catalogue." Here Mr Chapman is referring to our New Zealand Catalogue – as is generally known I spent some 18 months working on the G.B Catalogue. Its success is gratifying (Gibbons say that they have a **second** reprint under way) – but I am naturally glad to hear that our CP New Zealand effort is considered to be **"the ideal."**

MATARAE MILITARY CAMP

FEBRUARY 16 - 23, 1924



Otago Mounted Rifles with 200 men in camp.

Chief Postmaster, Dunedin, advised the Matarae Military Camp Postmaster on February 16, 1924 that the Military Camp datestamp was unavailable. "A new stamp will have to be cut and sent by tomorrow's night mail". (from Dunedin on the evening of the 18th).

This manuscript cancel is listed as N.S. (Never Seen) in History of the New Zealand Military Postal Services, 1845-119, by Startup & Proud.
